"I heard American political pundit James Carville opine to Jane Fonda on his podcast **Politics War Room** that there were no songs in the climate crisis movement. I immediately was moved to begin to write and produce this song," Moyer reflected.

Jeff Moyer's song educates and urges us all into united action in this world emergency. Moyer's company, **Music from the Heart**, established in 1986 has addressed diverse matters of consequence in the human experience including; acceptance of people with all disabilities and all other de-valued differences, anti-bullying, end of life, grieving and environmental action.

"Climate Crisis," includes a diverse chorus of singers representing various racial, cultural, and ethnic groups, disability, sexual orientation, and age. "My ad hoc chorus is certainly not inclusive of all differences but does represent some aspects of the world's uncountable differences." said Moyer.

The song was produced as a music video, thanks to the visual artistry of Susan Bredau and was premiered on the **Jeff Moyer Show** on YouTube.

Moyer plays guitar, 8 string ukulele, 5 string banjo, bass dulcimer, harmonicas, Lakota Sioux shaman drum, Inuit hoop drum, ocarina, cast-iron replica of slave drum from Thomas Jefferson's plantation, Hawaiian bamboo split sticks, and Native American wooden flute. Jeff's wife, Cristi, plays Tibetan Monk's bell. John Joyce, sound engineer in the song, plays Argentinian giant acorn spring wind whistle and harmonium. Moyer's ocarina was crafted by Clayziness Whistle Works in the same small batch of ocarinas that were made for the musician that opened and closed the United Nations' first climate crisis gathering Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro, 1992. The ocarinas were played by street children from Rio in that meaningful historic

gathering. Singers are Jeff Moyer, Cristi Moyer, John Joyce, Rochelle, Grace, Able Medina, Margarita and Moyer's daughter and grandsons, Laura, Scott, and Jeremy Angell.
